#### FOGGYE PUDDINGE

1 slightly stale panettone, crumbled 2 cups goose fat, shredded

6 eggs (for the meringue)

A pinch of currents

4 gills milk, or vodka

 $\frac{1}{2}$  lemon  $\frac{3}{8}$  orange

1 pod, or similar

Stoned dates

2 lb fairly plain flour\*

\*Optional

Infuse the pod. Rub all the dry ingredients together, fold in the fruit and then the infused liquid. Turn into well-greased moulds, cover each with a large woollen sock, and boil steadily for 7 hours. Serve with mulled wine. Makes ten 2-pint puddings.
