## WWHEN MIESIUIS WWAS BIORN

## FGOGGYIE PPIUIDIDIINGIE

1 slightly stale panettone, crumbled 2 cups goose fat, shredded 6 eggs (for the meringue)
$A$ pinch of currents
4 gills milk, or vodka
$1 / 2$ lemon
$5 / 8$ orange
1 pod, or similar
Stoned dates
2 lb fairly plain flour*

* Optional

Infuse the pod. Rub all the dry ingredients together, fold in the fruit and then the infused liquid. Turn into well-greased moulds, cover each with a large woollen sock, and boil steadily for 7 hours. Serve with mulled wine. Makes ten 2 -pint puddings.
